9.00 Service

Overall, we have had encouraging year of regular normal worship providing a good 'classical' service led by our wonderful choir with Communion on the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Sundays and Morning Worship on the 4th Sunday.

Within our worship, we focus on encouraging every person to be fully part of our worship in their personal presence and participation. The core elements of our worship include: a warm welcome on the door, as we sit together and afterwards; fellowship and conversation over coffee (with the 10:30am congregation in the 'Crossover Coffee' time); sung worship with a variety of hymns and songs; prayers and intercessions; bible centred sermons with application to everyday life; and the sharing of communion. Over the year it has been lovely to have new people join both the congregation and choir.

We also very much appreciate our Bell ringing team who ring and call people to worship every Sunday and with an extended time after Morning Worship on the 4th Sunday. And we are especially grateful to our choir led by our Music Director Michael Coker, supported by Emma Dean week by week.

Finally, we are very grateful for all who do so much to enable our services to happen week by week: those who lead and preach; those who read; those who lead our prayers; those who serve; and those who welcome and make refreshments. As we look forwards, we have a few things in mind: to keep doing what we do well; to introduce a new communion musical setting and music/hymns; to extend our coffee/fellowship area in addition to the back of church; and finally, to work on a new set up on the carpeted areas e.g., choir seating/lecterns, welcome and family area.

10.30 Service 'Sunday Central'

Over the past year we have been continuing to build up our 'modern/contemporary' service. We continue to work on our plan to develop the service. Things we have already done are: a new name 'Sunday Central'; crossover coffee with the 9am congregation; a new band location and equipment; sitting more at the front section (the back pews are roped off); installation of new AV and camera equipment (and training up of the team); and purchase/use of new presentation software called 'Worship Tools'. We have also been working hard on a more 'joined up style' and 'flow' to the service through the coffee time welcome, sung worship, bible reading, talk, response and prayer. As we look forwards we want to continue developing the above areas and focus on some other improvements: our new carpeted 'Family Area' to the North Aisle for families who come; our coffee/fellowship area at the back of church and including 'taking coffee/pastries to people as they arrive; more personally led sung worship e.g., through a 'sung worship leader' on 2nd and 4th Sundays (to be re-advertised); and blending the bible reading, talk and prayer together. Our aim is to continue to use a blend of licenced and lay leaders and speakers under the oversight of our core team who include: James Hunt, Bev Rutter, Emmie Kerby and other visiting speakers.

Finally, we are grateful for all who do so much to enable our services to happen week by week: those who lead and preach; those who read; those who lead our prayers; those who serve; and those who welcome and make refreshments.

During this time we have a chat about Christianity or just a wonderful informal chat amongst ourselves.

St Peter's Church Choir

St Peter's Church Choir continues to flourish in leading congregational worship through music. In 2023, the Choir comprised 20+ loyal and regular attending Christian singers. We are also able to call upon many singing 'reinforcements' to support incidental services and special occasions. The Choir sings weekly at the 9.00am Parish Communion & Morning Worship Services, also partnering with Worship Band members at 'Joint' Services. Additionally, the Choir sing at 'special' Services including 4th Sunday Choral Evensong and other Church Festivals. Following the Choir participation in the St Peters 'Marriage Preparation Day' (February 2023), the Choir were invited to sing at a number of 2023 Weddings, and supported several Funerals, as requested. During 2023, the Choir contributed to several Bishops Waltham Community events including the September Country and December Christmas Fayres: also, leading Carol Singing at the 'Crown Inn'!

The Choir are a versatile group of singers, providing a very wide- ranging repertoire from traditional Soprano, Alto, Tenor, Bass (SATB 4 Part Harmony) to 21st Century songs and including Iona, Taize, Thomas More, Rizza and many Anthems.

The Choir operate in a warm, friendly, worshipful, welcoming team environment – we enjoyed a Choir Christmas 'Party' and other social events during 2023! We will continue to seek new singers of all ages and abilities! Our close musical links with local Churches continued in 2023, particularly enjoying working with our Choir colleagues at Blessed Mary, Upham. We also participated in several wider Events in 2023 including the Deanery Ascension Service at St John the Baptist, Shedfield. We remain affiliated to the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM).

In September 2023, we launched a new Junior Choir at Bishops Waltham Infants School, led jointly by Michael Coker with a School teacher, and supported by a small team from St Peters on a weekly rota basis. Initially 20+ Year 2 children attended, doubling to over 40 children from Christmas 2023 with Year 1 children singing. We plan for the

Junior Choir to participate in Church/ Community Events in 2024; including the Mothering Sunday Service (10 March 2024) and St Peters Country Fayre (21 September 2024).

Worship Band

St Peter's Worship Band comprises 10- 12 singers and instrumentalists. The Band plays twice monthly at the 10.30am Contemporary Worship Service (Sunday Central). In 2023, generally 8-10 musicians played at 20 Sunday Central Services also collaborating with the Choir at some 'Combined' services. Additionally, the Band supports Church family Baptism Services, Family Advent Carols, Crib Services & Christmas Day. Increasingly we include 'child friendly' music for the growing numbers of children attending Sunday Church activities. During 2023, the Band made a debut appearance at the St Peters Country Fayre.

Michael Coker, Music Director leads the Band, working with various Service Leaders. The Band currently has 6 singers, 3 guitarists (including a Bass), a drummer, a flute, a violin, and keyboard player. During 2023, the Band switched positions with instruments on the North side of the Church (and singers in a more central position). We continuously review Band positioning and seek sound enhancements to assist Service Leaders and to enable congregational worship.

The Band are a warm, sociable, worshipful, team; and we attempt to work closely and deeply with Service Leaders and the congregation. We continue to welcome new singers and instrumentalists of all ages and abilities! We have extended a varied repertoire consisting mainly Top 100 Worship Songs (as classified by CCLI – Christian Copyright Licensing International).

As Sunday Central continues to evolve and attracts a growing congregation, we covered some 4th Sunday Services in 2023 with additional Worship Music Leaders (Emma, Danielle). The aspiration is to gradually enable sung worship at all Contemporary Worship Services, replacing the recorded music currently used when the Band are not scheduled to play. We play an active role in the South Hampshire 631 Worship Network & Training Group for Worship Leaders and Teams.

Many find this time of quiet reflection and the lighting of candles in memory of their loved one helpful and comforting.

Baptisms: Liz Webb

In 2023 there was a total of sixteen baptisms at St Peter's after the main services and two Thanksgiving ceremonies within the Sunday Central 10:30am service

It was decided to continue Baptism preparation sessions on line as this has really enabled parents and Godparents to join in without the stress of finding babysitters etc although still no substitute for face to face chats it does work for those who are joining.

The initial visits are still completed face to face (although there have been a couple of video calls!) and together with the preparation, the parents and Godparents have hopefully been helped to understand the process and the promises they were making. Although families are encouraged to consider having the service within a church service the majority prefer a separate time but it is wonderful to think what seeds are being sown when welcoming and encouraging families many of whom do not come to church on a regular basis. Your prayers are welcomed that those little seeds will grow by God's grace.

Looking forward

- Our welcome for those new to our church is very important so please do help by introducing yourself, and perhaps a couple of other people, and invite them to a social group to which you belong or home for a coffee.
- The space for between-services refreshments is currently somewhat limited but the refurbishment of the flexible side aisle areas should encourage easier circulation!
- If somebody who normally sits near you or you know about is missing from church for a few weeks please either give them a call yourself or tell Di or a Churchwarden as they could be unwell

Healing and Wholeness Prayer Group:

Annual Fabric Report (*-please see note below)

Thank you to all those who have worked so hard to keep our estate (Church, Churchyard, Hall & Stables) in such good order and to those who have given financial support through Planned Giving, donations and collections.

Overall management of the Church estate has continued to be exercised by myself in conjunction with Claire Alcock/Mandy Cawood, Churchwardens responsible for Buildings, Finances & Resources, supported by many other people and in particular those helping at the working parties, which were well attended. The Parochial Church Council has received regular updates on fabric related matters at each PCC meeting, including any Health and Safety issues

The <u>Church</u> continues to be maintained to a good standard overall. The problem of cracking in the turret identified by the Church Architect in 2015 continues to be monitored by the use of "tell tales", encouragingly no further movement had taken place at the last inspection in September 2021. The leaded windows above the gallery at the West end of the Church were repaired and are now watertight. A handrail was fitted to help those with mobility issues gain safer access to the dais. The clock has been taken away for a major repair and is expected back in early 2024. The bells were inspected and necessary maintenance undertaken. The South facing louvre in the tower was storm damaged and has been replaced. Hand dryers have been installed in the toilets. Remedial work was undertaken on the Church roof, including repair of a leaking lead valley

Looking forward, the proposal to create an improved area for children and families, an enlarged area for the choir and an expanded area for serving coffee etc which would see removal of the remaining pews in the North and South aisles and two pews at the rear of the Nave, has been agreed and should be implemented early next year. Consideration continues to be given to the possible installation of solar panels on a part of the Church roof

The <u>Churchyard</u> has been well maintained this year but work is always determined by the state of the weather. The wall at the top of St peter's Street was repaired. Some work has been undertaken on the "wild area" adjacent to The Old Pound but no final decision has been s ben made as to how best to tackle this area in the longer term. Any initial work and on-going maintenance would potentially be quite expensive so we are liaising with other interested parties (Parish Council, Wildlife Trust, Wilder Bishop's Waltham) to see whether some form of joint action might be possible. The presence (or otherwise!) of amphibians and reptiles in the Churchyard continues to be monitored monthly through the involvement of the Hampshire and IOW Amphibian and Reptile Group. The "Tommy" figure was installed near the War Memeorial on a temporary basis in memory of the fallen

(*Please note: Details of work undertaken in the Church and Churchyard and of the "fabric, goods and ornaments" of the Church can be found in the Church Log Book and Church Property Register which are available for inspection)

The <u>Church Hall</u> remains in good condition for its age but and following the taking down of the unsafe lean-to, a metal store was erected in its place which has provided invaluable storage. Hand dryers have been installed in the toilets. Maintenance tasks, repairs and upgrades have been undertaken and thanks are due to all those people who have contributed of their time to help create what continues to be an

attractive and well used Church and community resource. Looking forward, consideration is to be given to upgrading the A/V facilities to make them more user-friendly

The <u>Stables Parish Centre</u> remains in good condition generally with no significant structural work undertaken other than a roof repair. Maintenance tasks, repairs and upgrades have been undertaken and thanks are due to all those who have contributed of their time to keep the property in good order. The facility continues to be well used by both the Church and the community. Looking forward, consideration is to be given to upgrading the kitchenette which is looking very tired and in due course work will be required on the large office window

Children, Family and Youth Worker Report

Garden Gang- Wednesdays 10-11.30am

We have now been running 15 months and a lot of n**ew folk** come through the doors. We have a core group of about 8 families that are regular; **a lot** of families that come and go when they feel like joining in. (50 families on Garden Gang Whats app)

We have 6 months in the garden and 6 months in St Peters. The children love to explore the church and roam around as well as traditional play but also look to explore the garden and play outside.

Good conversations and regular routine with story time and singalong. We often read a Bible story and we have 4 'prayer buddies' (Mr Thankful, Mr Pleas, Mrs Sorry, and Mrs Others) to encourage and focus prayer time. We plan a walk around the graveyard as a fundraiser for WATSAN in March.

3 families come along to Sunday club that attend Garden Gang which is good.

A couple of interesting spiritual conversation with a couple of Grandparents which is interesting as they are regular attende**e**s.

The new family space is AMAZING and I am looking forward to settling in to enhance the Garden Gang mission outreach.

Current Team- Kate, Yuliya, Moira, Moray, Caroline and Wendy. Always room for more!

GWNN Youth Club- Sunday 5pm-6.15pm

Currently we have 18 attend between the ages of 10 and 14 yrs

All but one don't attend St Peters. We have about 5 girls now which is great, as the group has been 'boy heavy'[since I have been in post.

A usual session consists of sport or activity then snack and chat followed by a Christian based discussion and prayer. Some of the youth have faith some not quite sure and some don't, but happy to come along and enjoy the session.

We took most of the youth to Westbrook for a youth camp last October. Good weekend and good Bible teaching and games/ activities.

We have split the groups in to two age groups now & they attend on a fortnightly basis.

Recently **we** took the younger ones for a climbing wall and McDonalds treat and older ones we took Bowling and McDonalds.

There is a good link with parents via the Whatsapp group and we are hoping to see if we can run a camp this autumn at CYE on a static boat for the weekend! Waiting to hear from other evangelical churches to see what their interest is.

CURRENT TEAM ON A ROTA- Kate, Sam, Vicky, Matt, Caroline and James (stand by.)

Choir Club- Wednesdays 12.20- 12.50pm

This club runs on Wednesday lunch time and has become rather popular with the children from Bishops Waltham Infant school.

Currently Michael Coker and Mrs Moth run the half hour session singing a mix of songs and Roger is volunteering. I understand Michael's aim is to invite the children and their families to church festivals as a stronger link with St Peters.

Teeny Tinies- Tuesdays 9.30-11.15am

The gentle 'walking alongside' work of this group continues; the team of 5 support parents & provide a traditional play drop in session. It appears popular with families and maintains a link with St Peters with the families being invited to services and events; it is always encouraging to see them when they do come! There are now about 80 on the Whatsapp group with a core of about 15- 20 or so who come along very

regularly. Many of the families who come along to Teeny Tinies also go to Garden Gang and the same 3 families who come to church and Garden Gang also come to Teeny Tinies ⓒ

Sunday Club- Sundays at St PETERS and Stables

We have seen a steady growth in Sunday club. Most children are under 6 and a few around 7 to 10. We have had up to 14 one week and then one week be as low as 6. I would love to see more commitment from the families and hope this will shift over time.

The children have been learning about Characters in the Bible and an encouraging message to help us follow Jesus today. We have a lot of interactive teaching and games /craft. Some parents stay in with us. Current team- Kate, Yuliya, Jo (PARENT) and Jane. Rebecca Hunt has kindly offered to lead the older children once a month so they feel they are not in a baby group.

We have had the pleasure of helping a young lady to complete part of her Bronze D of E award with us a We will miss her very much!

We could do with more helpers for the older group so we can provide a better service.

Mission Team Report

As a church we support particular mission partners and people as follows:

- A. Mission partners: these are Christians that we partner directly with in proclaiming the Gospel in both work and deed, e.g., to encourage a young person choosing a gap year or early retired person to become directly involve with mission as an individual trip with an organisation or project either at home or abroad.
- B. Mission support: these are Christian organisations we support who are proclaiming the Gospel in both work and deed, e.g., Persecuted Church, poverty, health and medical.
- C. Ministry support: who are Christian organisations we support in general Christian ministry and discipleship, e.g., Christian Aid, Operation Christmas Child
- D. Community support: who are community organisations we support in a variety of Social Action e.g., local charities and support groups.

There are two extra forms of giving we have as a church:

- The Breadbasket, which is used for any disaster appeal, usually channelled through established organisations in the field e.g., Tear Fund, Red Cross; DEF
- The Blessings Box, which is used to collect donations when a mission speaker visits to talk about a specific project at a service.

Over the year the PCC give the Mission Team £6000 to allocate which we have as follows:

Meon Valley Foodbank

At our recent AGM there was one statistic that stood out more than any other:

In January 2021 we helped 16 families. In January 2022 we helped 30 families and in January 2023 it was 48. A threefold increase in three years.

These are troubling figures that reflect the difficulties being experienced by many local families.

We have settled well into our new home at Wickham Community Centre and are enjoying being linked with a socially aware group of people who also have HomeStart Hampshire as tenants and run a very successful "pantry" operation as well.

Food donations continue to come in from a range of sources including churches, individuals and supporting organisations such as the ladies' section of Corhampton Golf Club who have chosen us as their charity for the year. Financial donations have also continued at record levels which enables us to buy in food when donations do not keep pace with demand.

We have recruited some new volunteers who have brought with them new ideas on how we can improve what we do. It is likely that we will be looking for others as 2023 progresses.

The Future

The Trustees have decided that the time is right to appoint a paid Food Bank Manager. The operation has become increasingly complex as demand continues to grow and we seek to provide our clients with access to organisations such as Citizens Advice. Our service increasingly will become more than just food. An advertisement has been widely circulated and we are hopeful of making an appointment by the end of May.

We would also be interested in hearing from church members who have a passion for the disadvantaged who would like to consider becoming a Trustee of the Charity.

Bishop's Waltham and Upham Parish News Report

2023 Bishop's Waltham and Upham Parish News Report

We try to ensure a Christian ethos is reflected in the magazine so articles or testimonies from church members supporting this are welcome. Looking back on 2023:

We have had another successful year with 10 magazines produced and distributed. As indicated in last year's Report, this was done to mitigate the increased coasts of going 'all colour' by amalgamating the December and January issues when local activity is reduced.

The accounts (see main church accounts) show we made a Trading Profit of £1,224 in 2023. Over the past few years we have had a policy of reducing our reserves by making a Grants to the PCC but this commitment came to an end in 2022. However, we are mindful of the need of the PCC for funds, so we are continuing to review our ability to make a Grant, but on a year by year basis. This being the case, and based on the 2023 accounts, we are pleased to make a further Grant to the PCC for communication purposes of £1,200 early in 2024.

Collection of subscriptions continues to be a major source of income and due to the efforts of our distributors, £8,891 was collected throughout the year, an increase of £215. This is due to the willingness of distributors to pursue new subscribers both when there is a change of occupancy of a property within their delivery area and also in the new estates. They are to be congratulated on their efforts and the Parish News Committee extends their particular thanks to these dedicated individuals – we would be lost without you. Shop sales have also increased by some £300, and thanks are due to our outlets – Spar (on Winchester Road), The Post Office and the Coop, who are now selling 100 copies a month!

Malcolm Wearn joined us in 2022 as Advertising Manager and has done an excellent job. However, he would like to step down following the 2023/4 cycle of advertising activity. His replacement is being actively pursued. We thank Malcolm for his very committed input over the last two years, and hopefully we will find a suitable replacement. Other members of the team have continued in their various roles.

As anticipated in last year's report, we are delighted that we were able to come to an agreement with our current printer (The Print Room, Chandlers Ford) to enable us to move to all colour in 2023. This has been well received and certainly enhanced the appearance of the magazine.

Looking forward to 2024:

To date (Mid-January 2024) Malcolm has received advertising revenue commitments totalling £18,803 for 2024. This is a significant achievement considering the current economic climate. We thank local businesses for their continued support. Most advertising rates were increased by 10% this year, but an 'early bird' discount of 5% has encouraged prompt payment.

The biggest change that readers will see in 2024 is the increase in cover price (and hence subscriptions) to £1.50 and £15.00 respectively. This is the first increase since 2017 and follows the general increase in costs rather than just the move to colour. LEADERSHIP AND VISION

Parochial Church Council

The role of the PCC is to promote in the Parish the whole Mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical through helping people experience the joy of knowing Jesus

The PCC met seven times during the year, a combination of virtually and in person. The PCC continued to be supported by the Leadership Team and the Standing Committee who also met regularly during the year.

The PCC continues to review values and vision, highlighting what was going well and what still needed to be worked upon. There were regular reports from Kate, our Families, Children and Youth Worker, who was very busy in outreach activities in key areas. Numbers continue to grow at Garden Gang, Tiny Tinies and Group With No Name (GWNN).

"Welcome bags" were distributed to residents of the many new houses in the town as part of the continuing outreach to those who had moved to the town and there had been a number of new people joining the congregation and taking the Parish News on a monthly basis. Home/Connect Groups have increased in number both of groups and of attendees so that the sharing of our faith would not only happen at regular services in church.

The PCC continued to contribute to the ongoing discussions regarding the proposed restructuring of Bishop's Waltham Deanery, including formulating a plan for the Deanery as a whole; this plan has been reviewed by the Deanery Synod and the Deanery Mission and Pastoral Committee. The plans for all Deaneries in the Diocese are now being considered by the Bishop with the aim of creating a structure across the Diocese which will enable the Church as a whole to grow in depth, impact and number whilst at the same restoring (and then sustaining) financial viability. The plans are seen as working documents which will evolve over time but some initial decisions on the way forward have been produced.

Safeguarding of children and adults continued to be a very important issue and remains a standing item at all meetings to ensure that the PCC complied with Diocesan/Church of England policies in this area, including the Church of England Code of Safe Working Practices. Training for PCC members & other volunteers continues in this area both on- line and face to face to ensure that we comply with expected processes and guidelines. There is still work to be done the compliance front but many thanks go to Laurie Rickwood who has now handed the Safeguarding Lead baton on to Luke Hawkins who will be carrying out a review of policy & statements as well as further training requirements. Please see his report.

There were regular reports from the Churchwardens, Liz Webb and Mandy Cawood, who share between them responsibility for Worship, Ministry and Mission, Property, Finance and Resources. Please see reports in this document from the various groups & committees. Our thanks go to all those who have worked so hard in these areas.

Streaming of the Services continues to be available and has become very popular and appreciated. Many thanks to the AV team for enabling this to happen.

There were regular reports on all financial matters including the agreement of the annual Budget, monitoring this by way of monthly Management Accounts and Cash Flow and on various property-related issues. All internal financial controls were reviewed by the PCC to ensure that they complied with current Charity Commission guidelines. Thanks go to Paul Emmerson, Nigel Barnfield, and teams for all their hard work on these matters. We are still looking for a replacement for Nigel who has served faithfully for over 20 years!

Health & Safety continued to be a standing item at all PCC meetings with action taken as appropriate.

<u>Safeguarding</u>

Annual Safeguarding Report 2023/24

At the end of last year Laurie reported he would be standing down from the Safeguarding role. He has passed that role over to me and following a successful handover, I am now your new Safeguarding Officer for both churches. I want to start with thanking Laurie for his hard work and diligence over the last 8 years. Safeguarding was left to me in an excellent state, as the diocese adapts and changes to a more digital setting so must we. Following on from last year I have set out 2 levels of objectives which have been approved by James and the PCC.

Safeguarding concerns

Since the last APCM report, safeguarding matters that have arisen have been dealt with appropriately & efficiently. Whilst any concerns should ideally be raised with myself or James, as the Incumbent, in an emergency where a child or vulnerable adult is in immediate danger or requires medical attention there should be no delay and the police should be called immediately on 999. We are also fully compliant with safer recruitment guidelines.

Parish activities risk assessment update

Upon taking on the role and reviewing some of our documentation and to ensure we were in line with diocese requirements we have updated our activity risk assessments. This year I have begun asking that all risk assessments now include a list of all employees, volunteers and helpers prior to the activity taking place and further for me to be informed if this list changes. This will ensure that any changes are recorded and further, it will provide us with a record of contact with potentially vulnerable individuals should we ever need to run an audit. Those organising and leading parish activities & events understand the importance of completing risk assessments and in ensuring that supervisory ratios are in accordance with the Parish Safeguarding Handbook.

Parish Safeguarding Dashboard

At the last APCM Laurie referred to "Parish Safeguarding Dashboard" [PSB], an online tool that was being rolled out across the Diocese and which would make safeguarding administration and governance in parishes simpler. This has now been populated and is kept to up to date on a monthly basis. Our action plan has been uploaded and we continue to make progress against their requirements.

Medium term objectives:

Policy and Governance

I have produced the following documents, these help us to demonstrate to the diocese that we conform to their regularly updated guidelines and that we understand and know how to implement them:

- Safeguarding policy action plan
- Safeguarding policy for recruiting Ex-Offenders
- Safeguarding statement to be displayed on our website.

All documents have been reviewed by the leadership team and have been published to our website or stored.

Safeguarding Training and DBS requirements

Last year Laurie reported... Whilst the PCC is charged with the responsibility for "Promoting a "Safer Church" and "Safeguarding" continues to be a standing item on the PCC agenda, Safeguarding remains the responsibility of each one of us, volunteers and employees alike.

The Diocesan policies and processes promote the welfare of children, young people and adults by:

- Preventing abuse from occurring,
- By mitigating the risks of abuse, and
- In responding well to those who have been abused or seek assistance.

In support of the Safer Recruitment policy, the Parish has developed core job descriptions that can be adapted to a range of roles and the Diocese has provided guidance about what level of vetting [DBS] is required.

However, "Safeguarding" doesn't end with a "Criminal Conviction check" - training is provided to support all within the Church to effectively recognise and respond to possible abuse and implement best safeguarding practice.

The Diocesan training packages that need to be completed are tailored to the role being undertaken and, in the main, are conveniently accessible online. Most can be completed within an hour or so but others, notably linked to leadership roles, will require more in-depth training which reflects those additional responsibilities. I have received positive feedback about the quality of all of these courses. Subject to local demand, "face to face" training can also be delivered by the Diocesan Safeguarding team. Generally, DBS vetting and training will need to be renewed every 3 years.

This year... Developing a succinct STP training matrix (again based upon the diocese direction) is still required. This will be a pragmatic matrix (where possible) and we will ensure that the right people will be trained and DBS checked. The diocese has created guidelines for all areas of the church from employees to volunteers and helpers. We have always abided by these guidelines and will continue to do so, however we

want to make our church community as inclusive as reasonably possible and ensure our leadership can call upon volunteers and helpers when required.

The Diocesan training packages that need to be completed are tailored to the role being undertaken and, in the main, are conveniently accessible online. Most can be completed within an hour or so but others, notably linked to leadership roles, will require more in-depth training which reflects those additional responsibilities.

There has been an increase in demand for face to face training by our older generation which we are not able to immediately accommodate. Subject to local demand, "face to face" training can also be delivered by the Diocesan Safeguarding team, meaning it can only be scheduled irregularly. Generally, DBS vetting and training will need to be renewed every 3 years.

Long term objectives:

Record keeping

STP needs to update its current record keeping practice to ensure we have a full audit trail should it ever be required. The Diocese expects us to keep records for 20 years and at present we sit between analogue and digital records. This will all be moved (where possible) to digital records. In addition, as the church upgrades its overarching records safeguarding will fall in line and utilize the new systems being brought in. This will take time hence a long term objective.

DBS checks - Update service

Simply put, throughout the coming months as renewals are required I want to ensure that those wishing to be long term volunteers or active participants in church activity are signed up to the DBS update service, which allows for DBS checks to be renewed with ease.

The PCC has complied with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 (duty to have regard to House of Bishop's guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults)

Bishop's Waltham Deanery Synod

The full Deanery Synod met twice and the Deanery Synod Standing Committee also met twicelts main purpose remains: "To discover what God is calling us to do to be more effective in Mission across the Bishop's Waltham Deanery"

Transforming the Deanery-Mission:

The proposal to restructure the Deanery/Diocese started in 2021 and continued apace in 2023 with the aim to grow the Church in depth, impact and number whilst at the same time restoring (and then sustaining) financial viability. The original Deanery Plan was reviewed/revised by the Bishop and has been re-framed into implementation format, with specific focus on the Meon Valley Parishes. After much debate, the proposal to create a revised framework for Ministry and Mission development was affirmed by the Parishes involved, with particular emphasis placed on the need for an enhanced level of Self-Supporting or House for Duty appointments. Revd Andy Davis was appointed to lead the Meon Valley

Parishes and will be installed on 19 February 2024. It is expected that further appointments will be made in early 2024 to complete the initial phase of creating this collaborative Ministry framework

One element of the Deanery Plan was the completion of a Deanery-wide Parish Audit/Evaluation and the findings were presented to Deanery Synod and issues/actions arising from these will now be considered in more detail

Reports were received on meetings of the Diocesan and General Synods

The link with Wiawso (Ghana) has become more active now that tighter financial controls have been implemented and support has been given for the development of work at St Nicholas' Seminary

The Hackney Link was brought to a close with a celebration on 10 June 2023 at Wickham

Resourcing the Deanery:

A financial report was given at each meeting and the Deanery is well resourced at present. Despite ongoing financial pressures caused in part by the residual impact of the pandemic, all Parishes in the Deanery excluding one managed to pay their Parish Share in full in 2023, a very commendable achievement. However, a number of Parishes had deficits of income against expenditure and had to call on previously accumulated funds, a situation which cannot continue indefinitely

The Diocesan Budget was reviewed and unless income increases quite considerably, 2024 will be a financially challenging year for the Diocese. It has been confirmed that the methodology for calculating the Parish Share is under review with a view to implementing any new system in 2025 New Officers were appointed at the start of the new Triennium, including a new Lay Chair Paul Quinn Prepared by Paul Emmerson-January 2024 (CWP-Deanery Synod Annual Report 2023)
